RE : Title V Permit to Operate

DATE : June 22, 2010

This memo is intended to serve as a starting point with general instructions for those who need to apply for a Title V Permit to Operate in accordance with North Dakota Air Pollution Control Rules. Title V permit application forms and additional instructions are found at www.health.state.nd.us/AQ/AirForms.htm.

Please fill out any sections that are applicable to emission units at your facility. All emission points must be identified and emission rates calculated. Detailed information is not required for emission units that have the "potential to emit" of less than the quantities listed below; however, enough information must be provided to determine the applicable requirements. These emission units are considered insignificant units and are addressed in Section F - Insignificant Units in the permit application.

Particulate	:	2 tpy (tons per year)
$PM_{10}$	:	2 tpy
$SO_2$	:	2 tpy
$H_2S$	:	2 tpy
CO	:	2 tpy
NO <sub>x</sub>	:	2 tpy
Ozone	:	2 tpy
VOCs	:	2 tpy
Reduced Sulfur Compounds	:	2 tpy
All other regulated contaminants including the Section 112(b) contaminants	:	0.5 tpy

Memo

For the determination of emissions from an emissions unit, emissions of air contaminants less than 0.2 ton/yr (400 lb/yr) of a criteria pollutant and 0.05 ton/yr (100 lb/yr) of a hazardous air pollutant need not be addressed in the permit application. For emissions of <u>unregulated</u> air contaminants, only emissions descriptions (not estimates) need to be provided.

- 1. Criteria required for a determination of a complete application in accordance with Section 33-15-14-06, Title V Permit to Operate Program.
- 2. Listing of trivial activities which may be omitted from the Title V application.
- 3. Compliance Assurance Monitoring (CAM) guidance.
- 4. Air contaminants subject to regulation.
